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Japanese American Archival Collection Research Fellows Program 2024/2025 Call for Applications

The Japanese American Archival Collection Research Fellows Program (JAAC RFP) provides two (2) annual fellowships of up to \$3,000.00 to current undergraduate or graduate students (individuals or research teams). Researchers who live within a 100-mile radius of Sacramento are eligible for up to \$500.00.

The annual JAAC Research Fellows Program (JAAC RFP) supports the use of the Japanese American Archival Collection by research fellows for scholarly research and creative end-products relating to the Japanese American experience, including, marginalization, racism, the Constitution of the United States, as well as the principles of democracy and social justice.

The JAAC RFP is funded through the California State University, Sacramento University Library's Endowment for the Japanese American Archival Collection.

Collection Description

The Japanese American Archival Collection at Sacramento State chronicles the Japanese American experience of immigration and settlement to the United States, WWII incarceration, redress, and reparations. The collection was established in 1994 with a gift of photographs, documents and artifacts from the teaching materials of Mary Tsukamoto, and additional gifts from the Florin Japanese American Citizens League, records of the Sacramento VFW Nisei Post 8985, and more than 240 individual community members (https://library.csus.edu/japanese-american-archival-collection). It is international in scope, with an emphasis on Sacramento and the Central Valley, and is widely recognized because of the depth and breadth of its holdings. It includes documents created by incarcerees, governmental bodies, the military, concentration camp administrators and employees, and community members who were supportive of and hostile to people of Japanese descent. Formats of the primary sources include diaries, documents, pamphlets, newsletters, photographs, scrapbooks, artifacts, artwork, textiles, monographs, audio/visuals, electronic records, serials, and personal narratives.

Eligibility

Applicants should demonstrate how sources in the Japanese American Archival Collection (JAAC) will substantially contribute to the proposed scholarly or creative end-products. Demonstrated experience researching the topic is a required qualification.

Nominees can include researchers, artists, performing artists, documentarians, exhibitors, public policy employees and activists, among others. Candidates who propose a non-academically traditional final product are encouraged to apply. Examples of outcomes include research papers, lectures, webpages, works of art, virtual or live performances.

Application Packet

Applicants must submit a completed application packet that includes:

- 1) Description of project objectives and methodology
- 2) Impact and audience of the project
- 3) Description of how the JAAC is integral to the project
- 4) Collection materials to be used
- 5) Prior activities relating to the project
- 6) A research activity timeline
- 7) Estimated budget
- 8) CV or resume
- 9) Letter of recommendation, preferably from a professor or professional in the field familiar with your work

Priority Review Begins: April 15, 2024 **Program Dates:** Start July 1, 2024 or later

Covered Expenses

Based on the submitted budget, awardees will be compensated for travel, accommodations, and reimbursable activity to cover daily expenses. The Review Committee reserves the right to offer awards of a modified amount or duration from those requested.

JAAC RFP Review Committee

Fellowships will be awarded on the basis of applicants' qualifications, significance of their proposals, feasibility of accomplishing stated goals, and relevance of the proposals to the holdings of the JAAC. The Review Committee will consist of five members:

- Faculty Archivist
- Head, Donald & Beverly Gerth Special Collections and University Archives
- Florin-SV Japanese American Citizens League Representative
- University Library faculty member
- Sacramento State teaching faculty member

Post-Fellowship

Awardees are required to complete a post-fellow report that summarizes what specific goals were accomplished and what goals were partially achieved or not at all, no more than three (3) pages.

Awardees agree to the use of their likeness for university publications and outreach, in any format.
