

## A Message from Dean Kautzman

## **Special Collections & University Archives**

The Donald and Beverly Gerth Special Collections & University Archives had an especially busy year. With new department head Sarah Allison at the helm, a new librarian welcomed, and a years-in-the-making project completed, SCUA was on the move.

Over the winter break, SCUA librarians, staff, and student assistants worked hard relocating collections across the library building for the installation of compact shelving. The new addition provides space for 1,600 linear feet or roughly 1,500 boxes of materials. The previous shelving system included static bookshelves with limited space. Installation of these shelves provides secure and respectful space for collections like the Japanese American Archival Collection which contains family histories, diaries, photos, and documents of incarcerated Japanese Americans during World War II.

SCUA also welcomed Digital Collections librarian Elyse Fox, a long-time University Library employee, to the department. Ms. Fox will continue her work on born-digital and digitized special collections and archives, including the expansion of the Sacramento Movimiento Chicano and Mexican American Education Oral History Project.





This spring, seven works from the Royal Chicano Air Force poster collection were used in the Library Gallery's The Language of Color exhibition. The exhibition featured works from Sacramento State's Art Collection and, "...explore[d] the ways color plays a role in understanding the artists' intentions." The loaned works varied in time and theme from Rudy Cuellar's Committee to Abolish Prison Slavery (1977), to Eva Garcia's Fifth Annual Dia de las Madres (1979), to newer pieces like Xico Gonzalez's School of the Amerikas (2000).

The Hellenic Research Fellows Program expanded their program to include two Writers-in-Residence this fall: Eleni Sikelianos (pictured) and David Capps. Both writers came to Sacramento State to utilize the resources of the Tsakopoulos Hellenic Collection in crafting their creative works and gave selected readings of them in November.



The Sacramento Archives Crawl, on October 5, 2024, marked the start of Archives Month with a sports-themed event. Drawing 273 attendees, the crawl featured University Archivist Lynn Sanborn's curated collections from JAAC, Olympic memorabilia, and Sac State sports archives, with a 1960s Herky mascot plush stealing the show.



# **CSU Libraries Taking the** Lead on Al


ITHAKA S+R, a higher education thinktank and partner with JSTOR (your favorite full-text journal source) are partnering with 16 CSU campuses and an additional 30 institutions to launch a new project focused on defining and implementing AI literacy. The project will be conducted in partnership with librarians and educators to promote AI literacy as a core learning outcome. Together, we will conduct institution-specific and landscape level research on faculty and student practices, priorities, and needs around AI Literacy, and develop actionable pathways to integrating AI literacy into the curricula.


Participants will identify and prioritize core aspects of AI literacy at a series of virtual convenings. These convenings will inform the development by Ithaka S+R of qualitative instruments for subsequent interviews with students and faculty. These instruments will include options for modular individualization by each institution, allowing them to reflect areas of consensus across the cohort and the specific priorities of individual institutions.

Each local research team will conduct a series of interviews with students and instructors at their institution. Following completion of the interviews, the cohort will convene to ideate tangible solutions to the challenges and opportunities identified in their interviews. Throughout the project, Ithaka S+R will share insights from the cohort with stakeholders, culminating in a public report based on the aggregated analysis of interview transcripts.

The **Data** | **Tech Lab** is now open on the library's 1st Floor. Funded by a grant from the State of California, the lab boasts two 86" collaboration display stations and a 12'x7' Barco LD NT 1.8mm Direct View LED Video Wall. This semester we held a data management series taught by faculty for faculty. Next year we hope to expand the series to help faculty incorporate AI into their curricula.

At our **OER** Champions Recognition event, the University Library and Center for Teaching & Learning celebrated faculty who have made a difference in students' lives by adopting Open Educational Resources. Our faculty have saved students over \$5.1 million in textbook costs—an incredible milestone that shows the collective impact of OER adoption.

**Sac State Scholars** is the university's open access institutional repository. It provides long-term access to scholarly, creative, and professional work produced by the Sacramento State community. Whether you're an instructor sharing a public-facing project or a researcher seeking broader visibility, Sac State Scholars provides a lasting home for the scholarly and creative work that defines our campus.

Donated to SCUA in 2021, the **Sacramento Movimiento Chicano and Mexican American Education Oral History Project** tells the struggles, triumphs, and lasting impact of Chicana/o activists. This year, the collection was enhanced to be discoverable in both English and Spanish and expanded to 125 narratives.
